


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From the Playwright and Director

It's a little strange to write program notes from two different perspectives at once. Usually the director praises the script, and the playwright describes how surreal it is to see his words come alive. But I'm having trouble finding a charmingly self-deprecating way to praise myself, and in truth the process hasn't been all that surreal. What it has been is tremendously satisfying, mainly because of how freakin' talented these actors (and enactors) are. If I (playwright) may compliment myself (director): Great, great job of casting.

Way back in the summer of 2010, when I started writing *Apple*, my first goal was to make people laugh; if I also happened to say something meaningful, even better. In the end, I do think this play is "about" something more than laughter. In fact, I think it's about many things, among them a person's need to belong to something that both validates and absorbs him. One might say, a family—not necessarily biological. A community of artists, perhaps, who come together to put on a show. Such as Gestation Theatre Company. Such as the Mobtown Players.

Keeping this theme in mind has been easy. I look around during rehearsals and set builds and production meetings and marvel at all these smart, creative people who have given freely of their time to help me put on a show. It's a humbling feeling. It makes me want to give the best of myself in return. Brent Englар (Playwright/Director) has written several dozen plays and directed several more, including last summer's premiere of Erica Smith's *Come Out and Say It*.
